

It's that time of year again....

For 25 years now, August in SA has been the time to over-indulge in all things ART.

This year SALA, the South Australian Living Artists Festival, will be celebrating its Silver Anniversary in 646 venues throughout the state.

The TOTT Gallery is official venue # 474 and our exhibition entitled $The\ Art\ of\ Life$ is now open for your enjoyment.

Make sure you call in soon to see the latest creative works by our talented Gallery Members and also take the opportunity to collect your official program to help you plan your artistic August feast. You can also explore the program online via the free SALA App available on the APP store and Google Play.

Our 2022 SALA exhibition was officially opened on 10th July by Paul Rees, Head of Museums, Marketing & Major Events for the History Trust of South Australia. In reflecting on the title of the exhibition he shared these thoughts with those assembled...

"The Art of Life.

Now there's an intriguing title for an exhibition.



It's nothing but bold. It's nothing but strident. It promises some insight.

And after having a mooch about earlier today the creations that encompass paintings in all media, pottery and woodwork, fabric and textiles, glassware, metal sculpture, art cards/prints and much more, certainly do what is promised on the packet – they definitely are a connection to people who are living life through art.

I was reminded over the weekend of a play I once saw called Art. It was written by a French playwright, Yasmine Reza. It poses many questions and queries. One of the three people in the play has bought a painting. It is a white canvas. He has paid an extraordinary sum for the piece. To him, it is a bargain – possibly an investment.

To one of his best friends, he is a mug. It is rubbish. It is blank canvas. He's been ripped off.

The other friend in the play tries her very best to bridge the ever growing gulf between these two friends as they argue about what art is. In the end, the painting is not the thing that causes the conflict – it becomes clear that the painting is a device they are using to share their past disappointments with each other, how they haven't met each-others' expectations and old grievances are aired and debated.

But the centre-piece of the play is art. And it does promise to ask the questions:

What is art for? What does art do? What is the point of art? What is art?

I want to flip that old chestnut of a question round a bit.

What is art is interesting enough, but what happens if we ask 'why is art?'

When we ask why is art, we get different answers. And many of them are answered here today.

Why have these works been created?

Do they need to have a purpose or is that act of creation the purpose? I think it is.

Living a creative life. Bringing something new into the world, even if you are repurposing, re-using or changing the form and shape of materials, is in itself worthy and it does not require much more of a reason than that.

Henri Matisse said 'Creativity takes courage.'

Edward Hopper said 'If I could say it in words there would be no reason to paint.'

But I think my favorite is: Alberto Giacometti

'The object of art is not to reproduce reality, but to create a reality of the same intensity.'

You have all brought something to the table for this South Australian Living Artists Festival exhibition. You have created something that was not here before you thought about it and before you applied your craft and art to making it anew. You have either enjoyed doing this or you have been pained by it. Perhaps both?

No matter, I want to thank you for doing what you have done. For being an artist. For having a vision. For applying your selves to bringing something into the world that did not exist in shape and form prior. In the end, I ask again... Why is Art? Why? Because you did it, that's why. It doesn't need any more explanation than that. It's the art of life.

I want to wish all the exhibiting artists well. I hope that all who come through the exhibition enjoy and value the effort made by you all.

On behalf of the History Trust and museum team, I thank you for not only this exhibition but for the ongoing relationship between the History Trust and the Gallery. You are certainly delightful tenants. We appreciate that the Top of the Torrens enterprise adds value to the visitor experience for all those who come to Birdwood as part of their journey through the Adelaide Hills."



Lots of support will be provided to new committee members. Committee meetings are held every second month on the second Tuesday at 10.00am.


